### I Worried Mary Oliver

I worried a lot. Will the garden grow, will the rivers flow in the right direction, will the earth turn as it was taught, and if not how shall I correct it?

Was I right, was I wrong, will I be forgiven, can I do better?

Will I ever be able to sing, even the sparrows can do it and I am, well, hopeless.

Is my eyesight fading or am I just imagining it, am I going to get rheumatism, lockjaw, dementia?

Finally I saw that worrying had come to nothing. And gave it up. And took my old body and went out into the morning, and sang.

This piece is taken from a book of daily devotions edited by Unitarian Universalist Minister, John C Morgan and perhaps applies to each of us at certain points in our lives and is certainly worth reflecting upon:

"Whenever we wonder why there is something and not nothing: whenever we step outside our own needs to be with someone else in their pain; whenever we open our eyes to spend time observing one small flower; whenever in silence we feel at one with everything - in those brief moments the veil is lifted for us, and we can see out the windows of time, into the open spaces. In those moments we know what it is to be unafraid."

Every human being faces obstacles, adversity, difficult situations. Learning how to live is learning how to accept what cannot be changed, but it is also learning to change what must be changed.

Times of adversity often teach us about strengths we did not know we had. When life seems easy, we are not called to draw on the inner resources we require during hard times. And when we find those resources, we grow. We learn our capabilities; our fear of the unknown diminishes. We develop trust in a force larger than ourselves, that sometimes carries us into unknown territory and sees us safely through to the other side.



Dear friends.

As I look out of the window now, the sky is a patchwork of blue with white clouds and the sun is shining, while the wind disturbs fading daffodils readying themselves for their return to the earth. Not a few moments ago the same daffodils were being pelted with hail stones, no gentle transition for them!

And as we move through spring with its usual unpredictability, I wonder what weather we encounter? Grey skies, sunshine, winds that disturb as they rush through, cloud bursts of intensity or calmness. It makes for interesting awareness, to pause for a moment in the midst of the routine or busyness of a day and to enquire of our internal weather. I'm only grateful that my weather is as changeable as that of our national obsession! However we find ourselves, we can be sure that everything will change, it always does.

Spring will happen through all sorts of weather and it will bring forth all the beauty we long to see. So perhaps if we could change a mindset that refers to 'good' and 'bad' weather and welcome it all, we'd also know ourselves to be passing through on the way to some new found beauty within.

To paraphrase Rumi (from This being human is a guesthouse) ... Anything that is not love is only a visitor, you are not anxious – stress is flowing through, you are not depressed – sadness is visiting, you are not lost – confusion is wandering within, you are not broken – pain is passing through.

In all your weather, may you find beauty and peace.



Please note the change of date to the third Monday 20th May.


### .M NIGHT— SAT 25TH 7.30PM

## THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY - 95TH MEETING — by Rev Abi

Firstly, thank you, for the honour of representing clover street UNITARIANS as your delegate at this year's meetings, joining in the procession of banners at the opening service truly was a privileged. Thank you too, to Diane, for



guiding me through the plenaries and for generally helping me not to get too overwhelmed.

The overall theme of the meeting was 'Change', with many ideas being put forward on how the movement might navigate the inescapable shift in the religious landscape of our times. Acknowledging our founding ancestors for the freedom they bequeathed to us, it was also recognised that the responsibility was now in our hands, to carry that freedom forwards. No one can own that for us, only we can step forward in response to our understanding of that which we might call God or Life, or any other name, holding the Unitarian banner aloft for the future generations. The generations that follow may have a different idea of what our movement will look like, and equally, they may not be interested. Whatever is ahead, while we see a place for Unitarianism in our society, if we believe in who we are and what we're about, then perhaps now is the time to think Big and to think Long Term.

The latter, in essence was what the keynote speaker Roman Krznaric was advocating, alongside posing the question 'How can we become good ancestors?'. His enthusiastic and inspiring talk, prompting us to consider that while we think only of our lives and those of our children our vision remains fairly short sighted. If however, we think further ahead than that (perhaps seven generations ahead), we open ourselves to long term thinking, and to making much more transformative steps. That said, we can't get away from reality, and the reality is that many congregations are older and fewer in numbers, and it isn't easy. The intention of the General Assembly is to offer that support with initiatives and tools to help support congregations, so that we are empowered to free our imaginations. Everything is exploratory, not everything will 'work' and not everything will work within all congregations.

With an emphasis on coming together and collaborating, if nothing else will aid to raise our spirits in our shared endeavour – our standing together for that which we cherish.

The business of the meetings presented some fairly lively discussion. An amended motion for a ceasefire in Gaza was presented and passionately discussed, eventually being voted through. The motions for understanding Artificial Intelligence and supporting the campaign for No More Deaths were voted through unanimously.

The motion in support of Unlimited Motions for future meetings although voted through, was a fairly split vote.

Prof, Geoff Levermore took up his position as GA President for 2024-2025, and Rev Jeffrey Bowes was elected as Vice President. Three new ministers (Rev Lynda Kane, Rev Arek Malecki and Rev Jennifer Sanders) were received onto



the General Assembly roll of ministers. Honour membership of the General Assembly was given to Dot Hewerdine and Celia and John Midgley.

The meetings were a full and rich experience and if there's a take away thought, I'd say that its linked to what I witnessed; the past honoured and the new being embraced, old ways blended with new ways of doing ... A rope is made of many entwined strands, if one strand should weaken or indeed break, the rope still has strength. May our future know a similar strength.
